FROM the MENAHEL

Dear Parents,

In this week's parshah, Noach, the Torah describes a "safe space" in which a sampling of every species was cared for and nurtured during the *mabul*. This safe space, known to us as the חיבה is transported into an everlasting relevant teaching to every chossid in chassidus as referring to the words of davening and learning. Davening and learning are the safe space which protects us from the flooding waters of the world. How is this done? By inserting ourselves into the words of davening.

Hashem instructed Noach "tzohar ta'aseh lateiva". It isn't enough to build a safe space, you must draw light into this space.

Parents provide a safe space for their children. Providing them with safety and security is the baseline that allows further development and education. The Torah charges us to bring light into that space. The goal isn't a safe space, it is what allows our children to capture the light that we will shine into their lives.

Torah is light. Mitzvos are candles. "Ki ner mitzva veTorah ohr." Light is necessarily Torah. When we see light in the world it is because that space, idea or person are projecting a Torah value. Our homes should be places into which light is drawn and captured. Bringing secular influences into our homes is equal to bringing darkness into our homes. Our children may look at professional sports, or action figures as a source of light: entertainment and fun. It is our responsibility to impart to them that those spaces are darkness.

Let us all increase in light by bringing more candles into our home, increased ahavas Yisroel, which applies to our children as well, increased tsedaka and increased learning will bring increased light into our children's lives.
