## FROM *the* MENAHEL

Dear Parents,

In sharing with you the impact of the grand Hakhel, the kinus hashluchim, I would like to share a chinuch lesson from the Hakhel theme of the shluchim banquet last night.

Most mitzvos are fulfilled in the realm of action. It is therefore possible for a person to perform mitzvos on the surface, saying words of Torah or davening without much thought, without a lasting impression. Being that our neshomos are the deepest part of our essence, it is appropriate to look for ways to participate and perform mitzvos in ways that reach our core.

One of the themes ל"ח discuss regarding hakhel is that the large gathering of people, and the grandeur of the event would find its way deep into the hearts of all the Yidden who participated and will affect them deeply in a long-lasting way more than any other event and practice in Yiddishkeit.

The air of the current world is to protect and shield children from being deeply impacted about holy things, they argue that children should be cued and cuddled and allowed to develop at their pace without rocking their equilibrium and without overwhelming them. This isn't the place to discuss the hypocrisy of the current zeitgeist to overwhelm and disrupt children's natural and biological norms, which they see as a mandate in the areas that they see fit.

Experiencing the Rebbe was often an overwhelming experience, the memories of many settings are etched deeply into the minds and hearts of all those who merited to celebrate Yiddishkeit with the Rebbe. So too, when it comes to hakhel gatherings, the Rebbe charges us to deeply impact and permeate the hearts of our children, we are asked to look for ways to bring Yiddishkeit to the deepest core of our children's hearts and minds.

This is the essence of the mitzva of Hakehl. This is why the King leads this mitzva, since he is the heart of the people.
