Dear Parents.

With the days of Chanukah approaching, we begin thinking about the message and significance of light in Yiddishkeit. As Yidden who spend our days learning about and practicing the Mitzvos, one may ask, how did our service transition into being lamplighters? Our avodah is to perform mitvos not to bring light. Why do we use metaphors about light to describe our work rather than focus on the details of fulfilling mitzvos and following halochoh?

In addressing this question, our goal is to focus on practical and relevant messages. It is possible for a frum person to lead a life aligned with the dos and don'ts of Yiddishkeit, and yet, remain enveloped in darkness. In the words of the Alter Rebbe read this week ובחשכה יתהלכו בעבודת.

In the creation of the world, darkness was the default state. In our בראשית, our beginning, even as frum Yidden, is darkness. this is seen in the fact that the yetser hora comes first, and עיר פרא אדם יולד a person is born with tendencies that lead to tohu, vovohu vechoshech.

In our celebration of Yud Tes Kislev, we learn about the sacrifices and the extreme steps taken by Yidden to join the Alter Rebbe and transform their lives from darkness to light. As we raise children and focus on teaching them the mechanics of many mitzvos in many settings, we ask guided to ask our-selves, what about light? Are we introducing our children to avodas hachassidus and showing them how to transform darkness into light? Have our children observed people living in an extended aha moment of a chassidishe transformation? This Chanukah, let us listen to the message of the candles and bring light into the food, toys, games and vacation of Chanukah.

I want to take this opportunity to thank Mrs. Weingarten for bringing our PTA mothers impact to the next level. The Chanuka craft was done tastefully with thought and consideration to the age, logistics, cleanliness and a parent connected to the class.

Thank you Mrs. Lakein, Mrs. (Mushky) Raskin, Mrs. Wolowik, Mrs. Kirschenbaum, Mrs. Gross, Mrs. Lewis, Mrs. Gaerman, and Mrs. Litvak for sharing with our talmidim a hands-on pre Chanuka activity.
