## Online Ordering Summary

Please review the instructions below to order pictures for your child/ren.

Step1: You'll receive a link of your daughter's photos by class. The link will have both the individual portraits and class photos, and they will be arranged by class. Links are sent over via our gallery service Pass.

Step 2: When you open that link, you'll be able to customize your order by selecting which photos of your daughter you like best and/or class photos you want to order. We offer packages which have multiple print sizes, and also individual print sizes.

Once you're done making your selections on Pass, there is a checkout procedure where you'll make your payment, enter a shipping address, and then you'll be provided with tracking information on when your order should arrive (should be within 10 days). **Prints may arrive in separate envelopes on different days.**

### For More Than One Child At School

If you have more than one child in the school, to avoid paying shipping for each child's order separately, you can create an account on Pass, which is free. Once an account is created then you can save multiple orders for different students, and then place one order.

Feel free to create an account to save orders anyway, it is especially useful if you have more than one student. Let us know if you have any questions-meltserorders@gmail.com.

### Additional items not available Online:

We have three items that are not available on our Pass service:

- keychains
- magnets
- a special individual 8x10 print of the student portrait and class photo on it.
