Dear Parents,

This Shabbos marks the birthday of the Rebbe Rashab. The Rebbe Rashab is the father of Chabad chinuch. In addition to founding the Yeshiva, Tomchei Temimim, he deliberated on many aspects of chinuch and shared extensive insights on how to go about educating children and adolescents.

The Rebbe Rashab said that no one may modify the structure he put in place. Each of us strives to uphold the chinuch modal he shared with us and help our children understand, appreciate, and successfully live by his guidance.

There are two sides to the coin of education, the input and the intended output. By understanding what the intended output is, we can better appreciate and commit to what is expected in the input.

This along with *משפחה איין חסידים*, which extends to all Yidden, to share our Yiddishkeit with everyone we come across by example and by actively engaging with them as a *להאיר נר*.
