Dear Parents,

As we approach Yud Shevat, all the talmidim are learning Basi Legani. During this time of year, when we think about the Rebbe and hiskashrus, we are reminded of powerful messages of the Rebbe:

First and foremost, each child is a soldier in the Army of Hashem. A soldier is committed with his life and aims for nothing less than victory. Second, children area powerful influencers on a macro and micro level. They area capable of deep faith and of learning Torah in a deep way, as the Rebbe expressed many times with regards to five year old children serving as Rashi's target audience.

Nowadays, children are often presented with watered-down realities, riddled with compromise and mild expectations. When asking a child to do something, we look for indicators of weakness as a hint to adjust the goalpost and lower our expectations. Our message is that we don't believe they can deliver on our expectations.

In ever-increasing numbers, we encounter children who don't consider memorizing their bar mitzva maimer, or who refuse to learn anything 'extra', even refusing to learn at home. In some instances, parents acquiesce carrying their infancy into their preteen years.

Let us remember that our children are soldiers, committed to transforming the world through iskafyo and ishapcho.

Thank you to our PTA parents, **Mrs. M. Raskin** and **Mrs. E. Gaerman** and families, for treating the cheder students and staff to fruity treats in honor of Rosh Chodesh Shevat. May Hashem bench you with continued chassidish nachas from your children.
