FROM the MENAHEL

Dear Parents,

A big hearty mazal tov to Rabbi Goldberg and his family on the marriage of his daughter. What a beautiful and lebedige simcha it was! May you continue having nachas from all your children.

In this week's parshah, Beha'alosecho, the Torah tells us that Miriam was stricken with leprosy for speaking lashon hora about Moshe her brother. We learn that the Yidden waited for her to recover before continuing to journey to recognize her kindness to Moshe in waiting on him.

I would like to focus on two of the many relevant lessons we can learn from this story: Chassidus explains that during the time of golus, one of the ills that befall Yidden is believing gossip. A less than trustworthy person shares negativity about an upright person and a pervasive kelipa causes the listener to believe the gossip.

The impact of gossip is felt at Cheder to. A negative (often false) comment may stay with a parent for years and impact their feeling about the school attended by their children. Parents may feel misfortune about the school based on one comment. How careful we should be with every word, especially a critical word.

On the flip side, even when someone says something negative, we should treat the subject of negativity with empathy and kindness, we should look to highlight their positive qualities and act in accordance with it simultaneously. The Torah teaches us that while Miriam was being punished, she was being celebrated. Her positive qualities and virtues were highlighted by Hashem and the nation.

When it comes to judging people, we often live in a black and white world, people are either amazing or canceled. In Cheder language, a parent asking for a particular Rebbi may say "Rebbi A is exactly what my child needs, he will nurture him for life, Rebbi B would ruin his life forever. He will never recover if you place him with that Rebbi." The Torah tells us that even as we discover ugliness that requires seven days of isolation, we should celebrate the good qualities of that very person simultaneously.

I want to wish a hearty mazal tov to the entire six grade on the occasion of the hanochas tefillin of their first classmates, **Levi Bogomilsky** and **Yossi Tuller**. Mazal tov!
